





Ship Cancels – Italian Maritime

ERITREA and SASSARI featured in a short note by Dr. Randall Baker in RN #8. SASSARI has been seen on several Albert Eid covers, possibly all with SASSARI date 25 February 1926.



Ship Cancel - Cannoniere Toselli

References for postal cancellations for this vessel have yet to be found.



The cannoniere Toselli was based in Somalia 1922 – 1923 and would have passed through the Red Sea.

1960 - Inauguration of Arab League Centre, Cairo. Omnibus Issue.



Invitation card with stamps from the six countries issuing the stamps cancelled with commemorative postmark 22 March 1960. Two stamps are inscribed 'UAR' but with different currencies. Egypt – Mill, Syria – Piastre.



Black (country and face value) omitted.

The SG catalogue notes that a complete sheet was found in Damascus, so perhaps it was the Syrian details which were omitted.




The 5 halalah stamp has a double print of the orange colour (SG 1167a).

2007 - Butterflies.



These stamps and their descriptions, sometimes incorrect, are described in an article by David Jessich in Random Notes #87. The article implies that the butterfly image in the top left of the upper margin differed according to the face value of the stamp. The sheets shown above show that this is not the case as both the 2 SR and 3 SR can be found with the same image.

Two of the sheets seen to date have imperforate top margins, the remainder are perforated.

Summary of findings to date.

The eight different butterfly designs have been allocated the identification letters a,b,c,d for the top row, and e,f,g,h for the bottom row. Only six different butterflies have been recorded in the top margin.

The small butterfly images to the left, right and below the block of stamps are the same for all sheets of both 2 SR and 3 SR. Butterfly designs in the imperforate margins have not been seen in the perforated ones. The imperforate top margins probably come from the top of the main printed sheet.

The exact position of each post office sheet on the main printed sheet is not known.

The hunt for butterflies 'b' and 'f' in the top margin continues....



1917 – Hejaz Covers.



DJEDDA 5, 1 July 1917 type H10 black. Port Tawfiq (AR) 7 July 1917.

Francis Hugh Vallancey (1879 – 6 September 1950) was a schoolmaster, philatelist, philatelic author and editor, and dealer in philatelic literature. His business was destroyed during the London Blitz of 1941, but he rebuilt it after the war before ill health forced his retirement.

Death and legacy

Vallancey died on 6 September 1950 in Bromley, Kent, England. He was survived by his wife and daughter. His publishing interests were taken over by Tom Todd (1911–84) as Vallancey International. His literature stock passed through several hands and were estimated by Harry Hayes in 1980 to still be many tons, principally deriving from the Harris and Bellamy purchases.
